For Hoike, the chili was made with so much love and flavor by our cooking class. Many students and their family members came back for seconds.

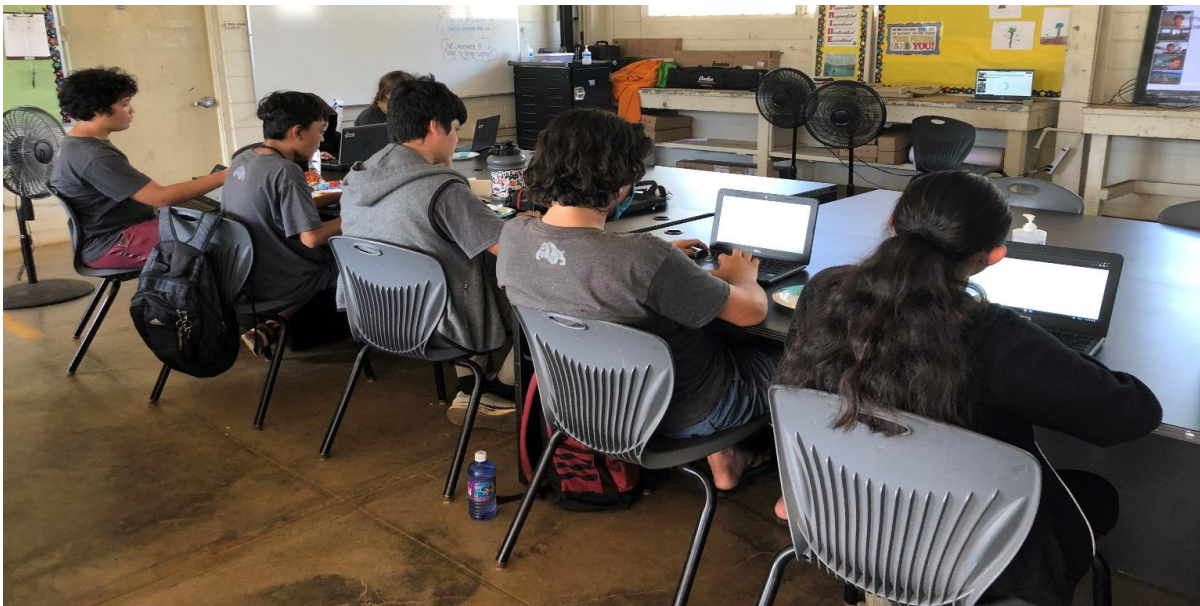
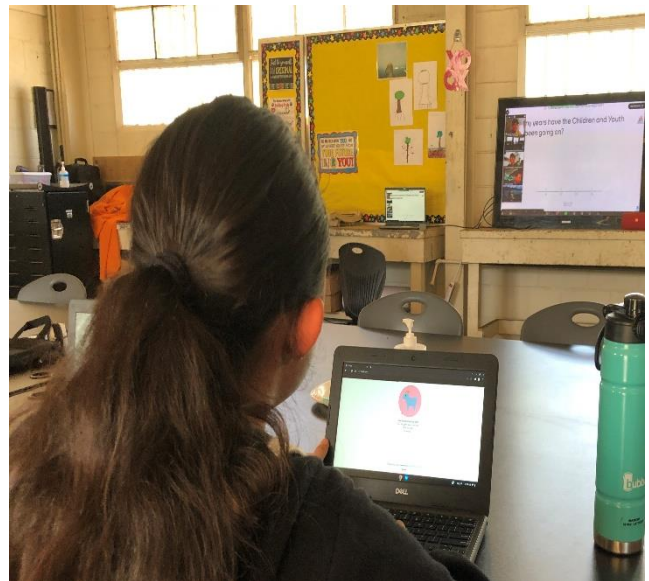


Students were happy to share a meal together and make new memories. The caramel apples were a hit.

Students learned about Newtonian fluids by mixing water, cornstarch, and food coloring together. They observed that even though the mixture looked like a runny liquid, it was actually solid.

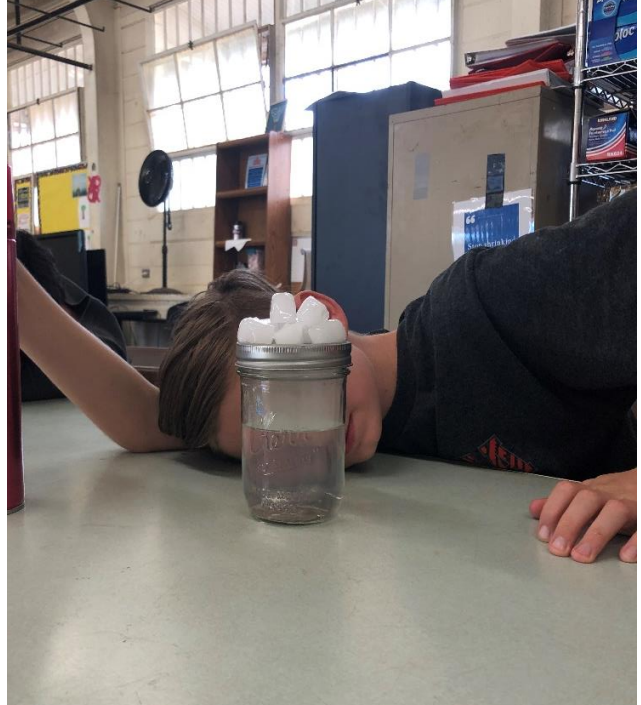
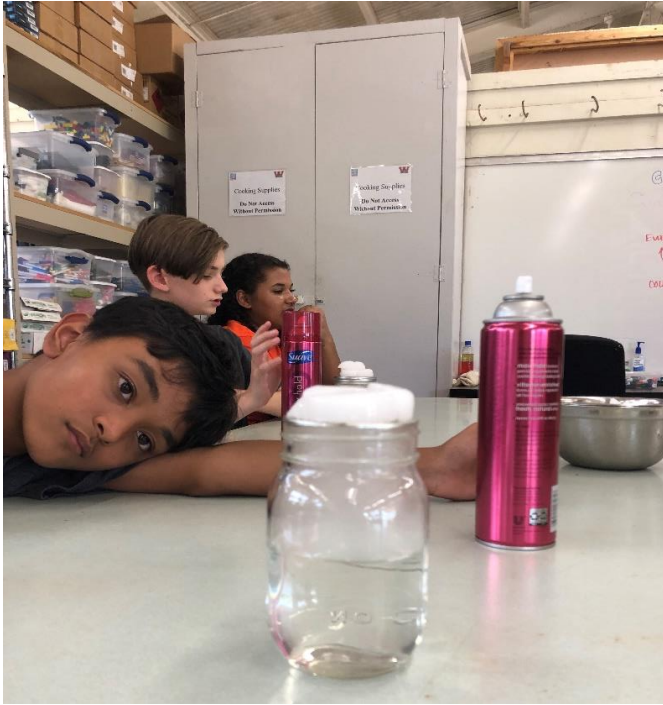

Catapults made with craft sticks, rubber bands and a spoon helped students understand potential and kinetic energy.

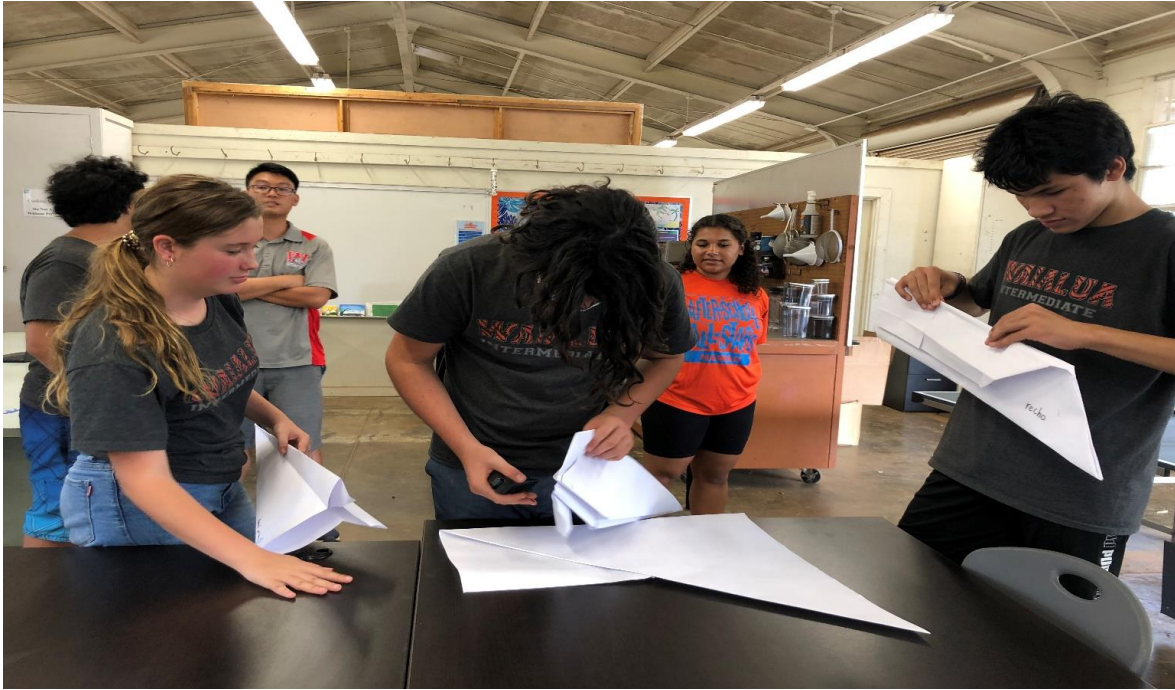


**STEM**
